(Practicing) Catholic All Our Strength

I didn't realize how much my arms would hurt when I became a mom.

It occurred to me first during Mass when my daughter was just a few weeks old. She was the kind of kid who could only sleep in someone's arms. I desperately wanted her to stay quiet during the service, so I held the swaddled bundle in front of me like it was a bomb, not daring to move. By the homily, my arms were on fire.

I quickly realized this was a common scenario of my new life as a parent. Holding, rocking, bouncing, restraining, dragging—honestly, my weak little chicken-arms had never been worked out like this before. It took all my strength.

But isn't that the way it is with everything that's worthwhile? It takes all your strength. Not some of it. Not most of it. All of it.

I am a fairly active Catholic. My faith impacts a lot of areas of my life. But there are still boundaries that I've drawn around God. There are places I haven't let Him in. Things I keep "for myself." Experiences that are just so full of *me*, so full of my own plans and my own desires.

But God desires everything. Not because He is selfish, but because He is good, and wise. Because He knows that the places we keep from Him will become filled with something else. He wants to get there first. He wants to lay His claim.

He wants all our strength. All our heart. All our soul. All our mind. Not most of it. All of it.

Do Catholics Believe in Ghosts?

Believe it or not, the Catholic Church does not have an official doctrine on ghosts. However, there are a few things that the Catholic Church holds to be true that can point us in the right direction.

"Ghost comes from an Old English word related to the German "geist," meaning 'spirit,' and Christians certainly believe in spirits: God, angels, and the souls of deceased humans all qualify."

So, at the most basic level, yes, Catholics do believe in ghosts.

The Catholic Church believes that the soul is eternal. So, when we reach the end of our lives on earth and our bodies die, our soul remains. Our soul is reunited with our body at the end of times. Furthermore, the lives of the saints are filled with stories about spiritual encounters, mystical conversations, bilocation, and dramatic visions of Heaven or Hell.

Let us also remember how years ago, Catholics referred to the Holy Spirit as the "Holy Ghost."

However, nowadays when people talk about ghosts, they are referring to souls of the dead who appear within or interact with the physical world.

As Catholics, we recognize that there is a spiritual battle all around us, but this does not mean that all ghost-like encounters are demonic. In fact, they may lead us to the Catholic theology on purgatory instead.

We know that not every soul is destined for Heaven right after death, so the idea that ghosts are souls who are undergoing a state of purification in purgatory doesn't seem too far off. **They need our prayers!**

In certain instances, God may permit a soul or "ghost" to visit the material world. The purpose of such visits varies depending on their origin in Heaven, Purgatory, or Hell.

The Church also teaches, while the supernatural may seem enticing to investigate, Catholics are prohibited from trying to contact the dead by turning to psychic mediums, Ouija boards, tarot cards, and the like. *In fact, participating in these is a grave sin and opens the doorway for the demonic in our lives*.

"All forms of divination are to be rejected: recourse to Satan or demons, conjuring up the dead or other practices falsely supposed to "unveil" the future. Consulting horoscopes, astrology, palm reading, interpretation of omens and lots, the phenomena of clairvoyance, and recourse to mediums all conceal a desire for power over time, history, and, in the last analysis, other human beings, as well as a wish to conciliate hidden powers. They contradict the honor, respect, and loving fear that we owe to God alone." - Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2116 -

Final Argument Why Vote Pro-Life

"I have always been pro-life, but does that mean I should always vote pro-life? What if I think some other things, like jobs or improved health care, are more important?

Pope John Paul II wrote in 1994 that Jesus would identify with the child conceived and rejected and say to us, "You did not welcome me," as He said in Mt. 25 to those who failed to help the poor and others in need. To them He said, "Depart from Me..." (Letter to Families, 2/2/94)

Two bishops in Texas, Bishop Kevin Farrell and Bishop Kevin Vann, wrote in 2008.

As Catholics we are faced with a number of issues that are of concern and should be addressed, such as immigration reform, healthcare, the economy and its solvency, care and concern for the poor, and

the war on terror... But let us be clear: issues of prudential judgment are not morally equivalent to issues involving intrinsic evils. No matter how right a given candidate is on any of these issues, it does not outweigh a candidate's unacceptable position in favor of an intrinsic evil such as abortion or the protection of "abortion rights."

Having a correct conscience is more than identifying what is right and wrong, but also placing the right importance on the issue.

Is this to say that we are partly responsible for the deaths of preborn children who might have been saved by a pro-life vote? Of course!

Our best chance of dramatically reducing the number of abortions is by passing laws that will restrict or outlaw abortion. When we vote pro-life we are doing our part to exercise the most effective means to curb this terrible violation of civil rights of the poorest and most vulnerable human beings in our world. "Being pro-life" and failing to vote prolife is like running a mile and stopping just before the finish line. Voting pro-life is the most fundamental way of being pro-life.

> "The most pro-life candidate is wrong on some issues besides abortion, so I am not going to vote at all."

If this is you position, you may have to wait until Jesus Christ runs for office to have a candidate you can vote for.

Five Common Mistakes You Could Be Making in Confession, According to a Catholic Priest

1. Being lazy or superficial.

Confessing in a general way without going into details or minimizing sins. For example, saying "I've been bad" without being specific.

2. Justifying sins

Making excuses instead of taking full responsibility, or explaining why the mistake was made instead of sincerely repenting.

- 3. Forgetting the intention of the sacrament. Considering confession a routine or formality, rather than a personal encounter with God's mercy.
- 4. Omitting serious sins out of shame. Not confessing major sins for fear of being judged, which prevents complete reconciliation.
- 5. Not resolving to make a firm purpose of amendment.

Confessing without a true desire to change or avoid falling into the same faults again.


