The Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord

The Epiphany marks the arrival of visitors, identified in Scripture as the magi, to the place where Jesus was born. Although we know virtually nothing about them, we do know they brought three gifts:

Gold – a symbol of wealth and power, identifies the recipient as a king.

Frankincense – the crystalized resinous sap of a tree used as incense and as an offering, is symbolic of prayer.

Myrrh – another resinous tree sap, was used in healing liniments and as an embalming ointment. Myrrh is an odd gift for a child – so, even at the beginning of Jesus' life on earth,

this gift foreshadows His death.

Reflection:



For much of the secular world, the holiday season has died down. Reflect on the joys of the holiday season and

what you have left to celebrate when the decorations are put away.

Pray:

Pray the Blessing *(on the following page)* on your home on the Epiphany.

Act:

Wish someone a Merry Christmas today! An easy way to evangelize is to wish someone a Merry Christmas during the Christmas season after December 25th and explain why. The liturgical season of Christmas begins with the vigil Masses on Christmas Eve and concludes on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord.

As a prologue to the Christmas Eve Mass celebrated in St. Peter's Basilica on December 24, 2024. Pope Francis performed the rite of opening the Holy Door. In doing so, he officially opened the Jubilee Year, 2025 which will run until January 6, 2026. The symbolic meaning of knocking on the door; "Christ presents Himself as the gate to heaven... He is the only Savior of the world, and to go through that [holy] door is to enter into this mystery of Christ [the gate of heaven], Who brings us eternal salvation." The holy door has been closed since November 20, 2015, at the end of the Jubilee Year of Mercy.

Pope Francis wishing for the 2025 Jubilee to be a source of "hope," for those in hardship.

"For everyone, may this Jubilee be a moment of genuine, personal encounter with the Lord Jesus, the 'door' of our salvation, whom the Church is charged to proclaim always, everywhere and to all as 'our hope.'"

Pope Francis said we are to evangelize, explaining that being "pilgrims of hope" is a timely message, because "people today need hope," an essential element of evangelization.

The traditional date of the Epiphany is January 6 but in the United States it is celebrated on the Sunday between January 2 and January 8.

It is a long-held Catholic tradition to bless one's home on (or near) the celebration of the Epiphany by using chalk to write a special inscription above the home's entrance. This weekend, we are blessing chalk at Mass for you to take home and participate in this tradition.

The inscription written over the door changes every year. For this year, you should write: "20 + C + M + B + 25"

The letters C, M, and B have two meanings. They are the initials of the traditional names of the three magi: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. They are also the first letters of the Latin words *Christus mansionem benedicat, "May Christ bless the house."* The + sign represents the cross, and 2025 is the year.

We have included a very family-friendly Epiphany home blessing.

Instructions For Blessing The Home

Using the blessed chalk, mark the lintel of your front door (or front porch step, or a wall within your home) as follows: 20 + C + M + B + 25

Saying:

The three Wise Men, Casper, Melchior, and Balthazar followed the star of God's Son who became human two thousand and twenty-five years ago. May Christ bless our home and remain with us throughout the new year. Amen.

Conclude by saying the following prayer:

Visit, O blessed Lord, this home with the gladness of your presence. Bless all who live or visit here with the gift of your love; and grant that we may manifest your love to each other and to all whose lives we touch. May we grow in grace and in the knowledge and love of you; guide, comfort, and strengthen us in peace, O Jesus Christ, now and forever. Amen.

The Answer

Have you ever had an epiphany?

I'll confess that I've never spent much time reflecting on the term "epiphany." In my head, there has always been a strict separation of church and state when it comes to this word. I think of the religious feast of the Epiphany, when we celebrate the magi's encounter with the Christ Child, as totally distinct from our modern understanding of the ancient Greek word *epipháneia*, which means "manifestation" or "appearance."

"I've had an epiphany," I have said many times before, and what I mean is that I have come to a long-awaited realization. I have received the answer to a question which has perplexed me, perhaps troubled me. I now know what course of action I must take.

"Today is the Epiphany," I say to my children when we make a king cake and bring the little magi figures to our Nativity beneath the Christmas tree (which will, after today, be put back into storage, for the Christmas season has come to its fulfillment).

And I've always thought I meant I was saying two very different things.

But today, I ponder the journey of the magi, one that must have often been treacherous and uncomfortable. I think about their meeting with Herod, a situation that certainly was fraught with tension and fear. And I imagine the feeling in their hearts as they approached the young Messiah and fell to their knees. I think of the peace they must have felt. The new, vibrant awareness of what their own purpose was.

It was an epiphany for them — a discovery of truth. An answer.

It should be the same for us.

Have you ever wondered why the magi had gold, frankincense, and myrrh?

Matthew's Gospel tells us. "Then they opened their treasures and offered Him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh" (Matt. 2:11). Why are these things their "treasures?" One possible answer is they were magicians and astrologers, and these three items were the tools of their questionable trade. In offering them to Christ, they demonstrate that they will cease using such items to predict or control life. They place this baby-king, the God of Israel. at the center of their lives. and not their own devices of control, manipulation and prediction.

Isn't that what we need to do, too? Consider, for example, the magical power of money, symbolized by the magi's gold. Seemingly whatever we ask of money, it does. It wields a godlike power over the world. It can predict the future by guaranteeing better outcomes for us – which is why it is such a tempting alternative to trusting in God. The problem is such absolute trust in money enslaves us to the economic forces that make money so powerful. In paying homage to Jesus with "gold" (i.e., tithing), we participate in His authority over (and therefore freedom from) the magical sway of money.

What things in your life do you use to predict or control your future? What in your life seems to give you power over the world? Those are your treasures. Are you tired of feeling enslaved to them? Find a way to open them and give them to Christ, and you will be freer.




